One of the representative novelists of the Victorian Age, the other being Charles Dickens, Bronte Sisters, Thackeray, Thomas Hardy.

- The central themes of her novels are Penetrating analysis of characters and profound depiction of rural England.
- Her novels are authentic and powerful mirrors of contemporary society as they truthfully portray the prevalent themes like transitional elements, industrialization and urbanization leading to moral and spiritual conflicts.
- Acc to William J Long, "In nearly all the writers of the Victorian Age we note, on the one hand, a strong intellectual tendency to analyze the problems of life, and on the other a tendency to teach......In George Eliot both these tendencies reach a climax. She is more obviously, more consciously a preacher and a moralize than any of her great contemporaries".

- CELIA BROOKE:-- Dorothea's younger sister.
- SIR JAMES CHETTAM:-- a neighbour of Mr Brooke. He is a beefy-faced young man.
- MRS CADWALLADER:-- The town gossip. She is a busybody who tried to set up Dorothea.
- MR CADWALLADER :-- The Rector of
- Tipton, and a good friend of Mr Brooke and Sir James Chettam.

- CALEB GARTH:-- Mary's father. Honest, discreet and hardworking.
- MR BULSTRODE :-- A rich banker in Middlemarch. He is devoutly religious but showy.
- MR FAREBROTHER :-- A Vicar in Middlemarch. He is a funguy.
- MR BROOKE :-- Uncle of Dorothea and Celia.
- MR VINCY :-- Rosamond and Fred's father and brother of Mrs Bulstrode.
- MRS VINCY :-- Rosamond and Fred's mother. She is plump and cheerful.
- MR FEATHERSTONE:-- Owner of a huge estate 'STONE COURT'.
- SIR GODWIN LYDGATE:-- Lydgate's wealthy uncle.

4. OPENING OF THE NOVEL:----

- George Eliot is a one of the leading novelists of the Victorian Age.
- Theopening of her masterpiece 'MIDDLEMARCH ' is suggestive of the setting, characterization and themes.
- Setting:-- The NOVEL ' Middlemarch ' is
- set in the fictional town of Middlemarch, with Loamshire.
- The novel is conceived in the provincial setting.
- That 's why, the author 's nostalgic association with the
- place continues to assert its significance. *The novel centers on the lives of the residents of Middlemarch.
- The Opening of the novel informs us about nature and character of various characters of the novel.

- We are told that Dorothea Brooke and her sister, Celia are orphans under the guardianship of their uncle Mr Brooke.
- The novelist amply makes it clear that the heroine of the novel, Dorothea Brooke is a girl of simple living and high thinking. Although she is beautiful and innocent, she takes least interest in pomp and show.
- The novelist describes it vividly: "She possesses a kind of beauty that seems to be thrown into relief by poor dress".

- The novelist tells us that Dorothea Brooke is a pious young woman. She's full of Puritanical energy and philanthropy.
- Her uncle fears lest she should refuse to marry due to overwhelming inclination towards religion and charity.
- She always persuades her uncle to spend maximum money to improve the lot of the tenants of the estate through renovations of buildings.
- It's because of her excessive Puritanical reserve and righteousness that she remains oblivious to the love PROPOSAL given to her by Sir James Chettam, a young man of her age.
- o ironically, she's attracted towards Reverend Edward Casaubon and calls him " Great soul
- It would seem that due to mental gaps and age differences, their marriage meets failure.

HISTORICAL ELEMENTS IN MIDDLEMARCH

- Reforms Act of 1832 brought in all round changes in English society.
- Renovations of buildings for the tenants, women empowerment, reactions of people against the changes.
- Dorothea's urge to her uncle for the renovations of buildings for tenants shows it.
- Her uncle and Mr Casaubon show conservative outlook.

THEMES OF THE NOVEL:

- VANITY AND PREJUDICE are represented by Lydgate and Will Ladislaw.
- IDEALISM is represented by Mr Casaubon.
- MR BROOKE represents worldly, and conservative outlook.
- DOROTHEA represents a true human being in search of true love, humanism, social welfare and betterment.
- She also epitomizes the positive changes in society and human beings introduced by the Reforms Act, 1832-37.
