ABOUT THE THEME OF SEMINAR

The idea of holding 'One Nation One Election' has been under discussion in India for several years, with proponents arguing that synchronizing national, state, and local elections will lead to better governance and development. This proposal has gained momentum in recent years, with the present government advocating for its implementation. However, the proposal is not without its challenges, with critics arguing that it may be difficult to implement and could undermine the federal structure of India's democracy.

It is not that India is new to the concept of simultaneous holding of elections. From 1952, when Independent India had its first elections, till 1967, the General Elections and State Assembly Elections were held simultaneously. However, after 1967 due to several exigencies, the elections for state assemblies began to be held at different intervals than that of the General Elections. In a huge country like India having elections every now and then have its own problems. Elections are a very costly exercise- according to official figures, the exchequer had to bear a cost of Rs 3870 crore in conducting the 2014 General Elections. Holding of state assembly elections requires a similar amount of money from the exchequer. Then political parties need to spend large amounts of accounted and unaccounted money in running their campaigns every time elections are conducted. Though the cost incurred by individual candidates would not differ much by simultaneous elections, however, the recurring cost on the exchequer and the political parties could be reduced.

Holding elections at different intervals has led to several problems in India. The frequent elections are time-consuming, expensive, and disruptive to governance and development. The political polarization that results from frequent elections has led to an increase in political violence and tensions between different political parties and their supporters. Conducting elections at different intervals is expensive, with the costs of security, transport, and other logistics adding up. Frequent

elections also lead to a wastage of resources, which could be better utilized for development purposes.

The current government has been pushing for a 'One Nation One Election' as a solution to these problems. The idea of synchronizing elections at the national, state, and local levels has been discussed in India since the early 1990s. In 2016, the Niti Aayog suggested that this proposal could be implemented by 2022, and the Law Commission of India also recommended the same in 2018. In 2019, the Prime Minister of India, Narendra Modi, reiterated his support for the 'One Nation One Election.' However, there is still no consensus on the feasibility and desirability of this proposal.

The seminar aims to explore the feasibility and desirability of synchronizing elections at the national, state, and local levels in India. The seminar will bring together scholars, policymakers, and civil society representatives to discuss the historical context, contemporary problems, and potential impact of this proposal. The seminar will generate insights on how to move forward with this proposal and identify the key challenges that need to be addressed for its successful implementation in India.
